






Public Consultation

- Separate stakeholder and industry sessions



- · proposals requiring design review
- proposals requiring an EIS
- construction tolerances
- Provisions to support:
 - EIS and inquiry panel processes
 - development assessment process
 - leasing system processes

Planning (Exempt Development) Regulation

- types of exempt development
- Provisions to support:
 - exemption asessment process







Object

Further matters for Object

In achieving the object, the following matters are important:

- the knowledge, culture and tradition of the Traditional Custodians
- planning for population growth
- Canberra's biodiversity and landscape setting
- high-quality, people-focussed and design-led built outcomes
- a sustainable and resilient environment

For the first time, the Bill also recognises the importance to the planning system of the knowledge, culture, and traditions of the Traditional Custodians of the land, the Ngunnawal people.

What does the Bill say?

10. Principles of good consultation

- The Minister may make guidelines about principles of good consultation and how the principles are to be implemented.
- (2) A person required to carry out consultation under this Act must take the guidelines into consideration when carrying out the consultation.

(3) A guideline is a notifiable instrument.

What principles would you like to see?

District Strategies









A new Territory Plan

The Planning Bill includes:

- the process for making the initial Territory Plan
- content of the new Territory Plan
- processes for amending the Territory Plan

What's next?

- Community members and industry experts will help us develop the new Territory Plan
- Broader community engagement on draft Territory Plan later in 2022









Development Assessment

Changes to DA processes:

- Single application pathway
- Additional requirements for significant development (EIS, Design Review, EDPs)
 - Extra 10 working days notification and time to decide DA
- Simplified timeframes for making decisions
- Pre-decision advice
- Expanded decision-making criteria
- EIS process EIS exemptions removed
 - Recent studies still used









Exempt development

- Standalone exempt development regulation for ease of access
- New exemptions murals and minor utility works
- Bolstered transparency and requirements for exemption declarations









Territory Priority Projects



The Minister's power is available only where all the following criteria are met:

- 1. The proposal will provide critical infrastructure or facilities.
- 2. The proposal is likely to provide a significant benefit to the people of the Territory.
- 3. The project is time-critical.
- 4. There has been sufficient public consultation on the proposal.
- Public comment period on proposed declaration 15 working days
- Once declared:
 - Chief Planner must decide DA
 - DA still requires public notification
 - No merits review and time-limited judicial review
- Removed Minister call-in powers









Increased transparency

The planning website will be an information hub:

- Strategic planning documents
- Territory Plan amendments
- Development applications
- Further information
- Applications to amend
- Pre decision advice
- Notices of decision











Review of decisions

- The Planning Bill outlines which decisions are reviewable by the ACT Civil and Administrative Tribunal
- Relevant decisions listed in schedules in the Bill
- Simplified categories of decisions exempt from review
- ACAT review is proposed to be full merits review
